PRIMARY PROGRAMME UPDATE

We have two new sessions to offer primary 1-7 children visiting us this year.

In 'A Journey through History', children explore how the climate and people have changed our landscape since the last ice age, and how our landscapes have changed us.

Meanwhile, 'Conservation Challenge' offers students a hands-on approach to local conservation. Tasks will vary throughout the seasons but could include building bird boxes to take back to school or helping to maintain habitats on the Aigas estate.

As pupils make their subject choices for the next school year, enquiries are coming in about what we can offer for secondary school students.

We are delighted to have groups of S1-S6 students at Aigas and design customised courses for science, biology and geography groups.

NATUREDAYS' OUTREACH PROGRAMME

Over winter, the team travelled to primary schools and nurseries throughout the Highlands delivering our Winter Survival outreach programme. With the arrival of spring we developed a brand new outreach programme, all about Energy Flow. We tried it out at primary schools on Skye, and children had lots of fun learning how energy moves through food webs, some of the weird and wonderful things animals do to find food, and how marine plastics can interrupt natural energy flows. Since then, we have taught the sessions to nearly 300 primary and nursery pupils in their schools and playgrounds.

WILDLIFE GARDEN

We are making a wildlife garden at the back of the Magnus House.

In the last few weeks we have made a caterpillar garden using old tyres. These were painted by children on Aigas Field Centre's Nature's Child programme in 2017 and planted with native wildflower seeds donated by Kew Garden's Grow Wild scheme. This will provide essential pollen and nectar for butterflies and bees throughout the summer.

Bulbs planted in Autumn by our wonderful Rural Skills group have flowered, and new herbs are starting to grow in the freshly weeded sensory garden. Over the summer we will build a new compost bin, develop the bird feeding station and keep adding to our everexpanding bug hotel. Watch this space for more updates!



RANGER TRAINING

You might meet some new additions to our team this year!

In February and March we made the most of Aigas Field Centre's annual Aigas Ranger Training Scheme to improve our knowledge of Highland natural history, social history, geology, forestry, land use and more.

Even better, the Naturedays team led a week of training. Rangers learned about the Scottish education system, Curriculum for Excellence, group management, adapting sessions for participants with additional support needs and how to plan an effective lesson. At the end of the week, they planned and taught workshops on food webs, plastics and predator-prey relationships to children at our local primary school. The Naturedays team love working with the Rangers, and it's great seeing them use their new-found skills with adult guests at the Field Centre.

You will be sad to hear that Charlie is leaving at the end of the month to take on a new adventure. We will all miss her, but we look forward to introducing her replacement in the next newsletter!
